### Year in Review

Dana and I had an interesting discussion about what the colors of the arrows above this message should be. Green usually indicates increases in service, productivity, profit, and the like. Retirement accounts thrive, crop yields surge, and game attendance spikes when emerald arrows show.

Increases in the needs of community members aren't usually seen as a good thing, though. These indicate that people are struggling—and they are. Comparing the end of 2022 to just a year before, Wisconsin families averaged \$154 more in food and housing expenses each month.

And crucial assistance is about to decrease for those most in need. In February the federal increase to Wisconsin's FoodShare program will end. This will reduce the food assistance to 4,200 Dunn County residents by a minimum of \$95 per person—with an average reduction in assistance of \$212—each month.

In response to this coming need, the Stepping Stones Board of Directors directed me to increase our preliminary 2023 food budget. In response to the long lines at our pantry, we will increase distribution hours. In response to the many calls for shelter that we can only answer with waitlists, referrals and apologies, we are building a new shelter.

The goodwill of a broader community can be seen in both the service Stepping Stones provided in 2022 and the impact on lives that we will make in 2023. Your words, your work and your wallet make it so that the needs of your neighbors are met with increased assistance.

This is a good thing.

for 2022. An increased need in our community meant an increased need for services.

In September, we added another day of pantry hours and are now open five days a week. In October, we added another pop-up pantry location with the help of a grant from the Community Foundation of Dunn County, bringing us up to six pop-up locations. And by March, we will have extended pantry hours. The word *increase* is everywhere but you know what else increased? Your food and financial donations to the pantry; the number of volunteers working the pantry; the amount of food brought in through our Farmers Feed program. So keep those increases coming!

How can we encompass all the activity in the shelter program in 2022 into a short paragraph? The need for shelter was greater than 2021 (see below),

and we were able to shelter 214 households, 58% were Menomonie residents and 69% were Dunn County residents. But there is still more we can do - insert a \$1.4 million grant from the State of Wisconsin for a new emergency shelter. The ground breaking is scheduled with

construction starting in early Spring and a fully-functioning shelter by November. We expect 2023 to be quite a bustle of activity with clients and construction, and we look forward to bringing this emergency shelter to life.

With Covid restrictions lifting in the area, the Community Connections program was able to get back to work, connecting community members in need with our growing volunteer-base. Our most exciting addition to the program was *Van GOgh*, who we were able to purchase thanks to a grant from Feed My People along with sponsorship from *WEST* consin Credit Union.

By the end of 2022, we had signed up 80 seniors as part of our Senior Commodity Program, 20 of which are home-delivered by volunteers. It is the highlight of the month for our clients because they get to visit with volunteers. 


